



Coming Together In Community

The Bond passed! That is what everyone in our "community" is saying. Some said it happily, and some, not so much. But it got me thinking about community and how we all fit together.

It all starts with the first understanding of where I fit, physically, in the world of communities.

My community lies at the intersection of Meridian and 224th.

At the corner of 224th and Meridian stretches a community that has been around for over a century. I come from a place with no definite form or shape, no local government, no committed centralized community, and no designated town. There are no boundaries and no form; just the choes of past farms and homesteads, cows mooing in the now closed dairy farms, men gathered at the local Grange, and kids biking down dirt roads toward the river.

When I moved here 28 years ago, the area was talked about in terms of the nearest Grange. I lived out past the Graham 4-corners, where the Thrift Grange stood. The non-specific town encompassed the Graham Grange, the Thrift Grange, the Orting Grange, and the Kapowsin Grange. If you got as far as the Elk Plain Grange, you were into Spanaway Country, another boundless entity with no centralized community.

Community – I'm part of many communities, and all my communities are equally important to my personal well-being.

I am part of a family community ~ both nuclear and extended. I belong to a community of co-workers and also, the larger school community. Several of us make a community of friends that extends from being brought together by work. Belonging to my Book Club makes me part of a community bound by the love of books. One of my communities is rooted in personal one-on-one experiences over time. There is even a community for me in the internet world, built of individuals who share a love of natural places, such as National Parks and National Wildlife Refuges.

You get the idea. We are communal creatures, like a mob of crows who share food and sleeping centers. Crows also share, like us, the mourning of a fellow community member or the collecting of shiny bobbles. Many species also exhibit our need for connection our local orca pods, troops of macaque monkeys, hills of ants, a colony of aspens, and wolf packs. All these examples remind us we are members of an even larger community - the living things that inhabit our largest community - Earth.

And this census-designated place (CDP) in Pierce County recently came together to support the largest designated entity in our unincorporated area, the Bethel School District. That was the work of Community, and this Community member is glad.

THE READ AND LEAD ICE CREAM PARTY is a great event to flex our recycling know-how. About 75% of the packaging from the supplies can be recycled either in curbside recycle totes or at the recycle center in Tacoma. These include all the plastic ice cream tubs, plastic lids and caps, plastic bottles and tubs from toppings, plastic bottles of syrup, and even aerosol whipped cream cans (these have to be taken to Tacoma along with all the caps and lids). We are also using metal spoons from the central kitchen instead of throwing away 700 plastic spoons. Most of what we throw away will be just be napkins, paper bowls, uneaten ice cream, and any cardboard ice cream containers. This means that instead of making around 6 bags of trash, we will only be making about 2. That's a 66% decrease in what we send to the landfill!

To date, here's what we have collected from our lunchroom!

- » 365 gallons of compost
- » 4,000 pieces of Terracycle
- » 650 Lunchable trays


420 gallons (7 large trash bags) of rigid plastic »

Terracycle items for the 2018/19 School Year:

- Plastic Cereal Bags & Cereal Box Liners
- Applesauce/Yogurt Pouches & Caps
- Foil-Lined Energy Bar Wrappers
- All Clif Product Wrappers
- Toothbrushes and Toothpaste Tubes
- Deodorant Containers
- Floss Dispensers

Any brand of the above products will be accepted. All items can be stored and dropped off "mixed" except hygiene items. Please collect those in a separate bag.

All of these items earn the PTA money. Over the last 2 years we've earned over \$500!

provided food from the drive. 6 boxes were given to the backpack program. Snacks were given to Mrs. Maddox. 3 car loads were taken to the Nourish food bank.

Popcorn—Christine Link reports that popcorn committee raised enough money for each student to have free popcorn 1 Friday per month for the remainder of the school year.

Fall Carnival—Christine Link reports that a new chair person is needed for Fall Carnival for next school year.

Membership—Christine Link reports that a new chair person is needed for Membership committee next year. This committee is mainly needed for the beginning of the school year.

Box Tops—Rebecca Byers reports that the deadline to submit Box Tops in March 1, so the school deadline will be February 15. The school earned \$720 from Box Tops in the fall.

Book Fair—Shaunna Ruda reports earnings, etc from fall book fair. Total sales were\$5,704.40 and \$5,219.03 before tax. Elk Plain received half of that amount back in Scholastic dollars. \$35 was given to each teacher x 28 teachers. Mrs. Maddox was given \$10 gift cards to be used for students in need.

Holiday Shop—Heather Bahrt reports that \$20 vouchers provided to Mrs. Maddox have been used well by the students.
