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Thank you to all of our families for a great start to the school year. It has been an eventful year so far! With Fundraiser, Fall Carnival, and Book Fair behind us, we embark on events that keep our Families In Need committee very busy and are near and dear to our hearts. November's annual Food Drive and January's clothing drive give us the chance to give back to the community and hopefully make a difference in the lives of others.

EPSOC PTA's "Fill the Bag" themed food drive runs from Friday, November 1st through Friday, November 22nd. This year's goal is to collect 3500 nonperishable items school wide to be donated to FISH Food Bank of Pierce County. FISH is an organization almost completely operated by volunteers and serves the Graham, Spanaway, and Parkland communities among many others. Collecting food for the needy is a significant opportunity for our children to practice selflessness and charity while supporting those in their own neighborhood and school.

In January, EPSOC PTA will hold it's second ever Clothing Drive. Gently used adult and children's clothing is collected and donated to Wear It Out, a free clothing bank located right here in Spanaway that benefits all Bethel families. Last year, we donated over 3000 articles of clothing and shoes! Of course, we will beat that total this time around! More information about the Clothing Drive will be in our January newsletter.

With the holidays right around the corner, we would like to give thanks for our wonderful committee chairpersons, volunteers, and families. our part this year I'm sure we can at least double that number especially with the holiday shopping season right around the corner. Take a few minutes to read the instructions below and register your cards so that as you shop EPSOC PTA gets the rewards!

Target

To get Target rebates simply **register your REDcard at Target's Take Charge of Education page** in the REDcard section of the Target website. Select Elk Plain School of Choice as your school and the PTA will receive up to 1% on all REDcard purchases.

eScrip

There are 2 ways to earn funds through eScrip. The first is by simply using your registered cards when making purchases. The second is actually shopping online through the eScrip website from hundreds of retailers including Amazon.com (2.4%), Target (2.4%), REI (3%) Macy's (3%), PetSmart (4.8%), Home Depot (3.6%), Toys R Us (1.2%), Crate and Barrel, Office Depot, LEGO--the list and fundraising potential goes on and on!

1: Register your Safeway, credit and debit cards at eScrip.com

- Go to www.escrip.com
- Click on "my eScrip", create an account or login if you already have one
- Click on "Add Cards Now!" Add as many cards as you like.
- Search for and choose Elk Plain School of Choice to receive the contributions. Now when you use those cards EPSOC PTA receives a percentage-and a little bit adds up just like Box Tops and Labels for Education.
- **2:** Shop at eScrip Online Mall.
- The key to this benefit is starting your shopping session from the eScrip website. *Think eScrip before you buy!*
- Once you are signed into eScrip.com, click on "Online Mall" at the top right
- Find the retailer of your choice (or click on All Stores) and click on the retailer's name. You'll be taken to their website from eScrip.
- Start shopping and a percentage of your total purchase comes back to Elk Plain. It's that easy!



FACING FEARS | SRAH DRIDAR

Have you ever sat in a room full of people and been visited with the feeling that you are the only one that is completely clueless about what is going on? Everyone else seems to be taking notes, or nodding, and asking coherent questions. That has been me recently, mostly sitting and thinking, "WHAT?" My fears are met, I am totally lost, everyone else knows the answer and I don't seem to have grasped the question yet.

Some fears never change, such as the fear of not being prepared for a test. But others of my fears have drastically morphed since my 20's.

In my twenties my fears were more localized to self-doubt items: I was

afraid I wouldn't be good enough. I was afraid I didn't look good. I was afraid I would never amount to much. I was concerned about being a good parent. I was afraid I couldn't cook. And, leftover from my childhood, I was afraid of the dark.

In my thirties my fears were more centered on my new children: I was afraid my baby would stop breathing in the middle of the night, or some stranger would abduct them, or some obscure random disease might afflict them. I was afraid I couldn't do everything, including cook. I was afraid I'd never look good. And, I was afraid of the dark.

In my forties many of my fears were

at bay due to exhaustion: I was afraid my children would grow up too fast. I was afraid I didn't even know what everything was I needed to do! I was afraid I didn't have enough energy to look good ... or cook. And, I still might have been afraid of the dark but was too tired to care.

In my fifties my fears have transformed at a breathtaking pace: I am afraid I don't care anymore what others think I look like. I am afraid my children will never grow up. And leave me alone (they could still visit but live somewhere else). Unless they wanted to cook because I am afraid I'm tired of thinking what to make every night!

All this talk of fears may imply I live a fearful life. In reality, learning to face my fears has helped me live a more fulfilling life. I don't want to be immobilized by my fears but emboldened by them. Recognizing and facing my fears has allowed me to do things I never thought possible. Embracing the fear, and still moving on, I have learned is, for me, the only way forward. And after all these years ~ I am no longer afraid of the dark. But now earwigs ... they still give me the willies!

ESPOC General Membership Meeting Sept. 27th 2013

Called to order at 6:37pm Quorum: yes.

Door prizes were given. A brief history of the PTA was shared with the goal of striving to help give our kids the best education possible. Officers and Committee Chairs were introduced.

Principals Report:

- We have 150 new families at our our school this year with a total of 466 students!
- This is a levy year. This February we vote. If the levy passes we will receive funding in order to become a K-8 school in the near future.
- ESPOC officially purchased the land next to the school in June. We will have three new portables which will have their own designated restrooms.
- The school will be getting some updating including bleachers in the gym area, renovated bathrooms in one of the wings. Our parking lot will also be approximately tripled in size with 25 car slots for parent pick up. Busses will be in the back side of the school which will also cut down congestion before and after school.
- Please make any transportation changes for your student no later than 1:15pm.

<u>Review of Minutes:</u> Minutes were reviewed. Shannon Gregory motioned to approve them, Staci Sherrod seconded. Minutes were voted on, approved and filed

<u>Financial Report:</u> We just received our check from last May's Family Fun McTeacher Night. We received \$580.12 + tips! This money will be included in this year's budget. Budget was reviewed and filed.

New Business: We have several upcoming events this month:

- Save Around Fundraiser starts 10/4 and will run until 10/21.
- The 6 week Parenting with Love and Logic class will be offered from 6:30-7:30 Tuesday nights beginning 10/8 and will end 11/19. Free child care will be available for those interested.
- The Fall Book Fair will run during conference week 10/21-10-25. This year it will be held in the Gym.
- The Fall Carnival will be 10/25. We are in need of volunteers and donations of cakes or cupcakes for the cake walk and individually wrapped candy for game prizes. Back by popular demand there will also be a costume contest. A flyer will be sent home with students with more information and presales of tickets will be available.
- The ESPOC website is up and running. Check it out at EPSPTA.org and be sure to "like" us on Facebook.
