DIVERSIONS from Mrs. Park

The Most Wonderful Time of the Year

Arguably for most people the end of December - with its celebrations, Christmas everything, and time off with family and friends - wins the distinction of "most wonderful time of the year". But I think this year I found a better answer to the question. I found the answer in an old, favorite story.

Christmas and holiday movies are, for me, the best way to spend December nights that are dark and busy with holiday tasks. I revel in crying through sappy dialogue, contrived moments, and tear jerking scenes. Love them all, even the dumb "made for television" events and especially the older, lovely cinematic holiday diversions such as Charles Dickens's A Christmas Carol.

During the past month I ended up watching four different interpretations of A Christmas Carol. Troops of ghosts from Christmas past, present, and future galloped across my TV screen as I watched Ebenezer Scrooge cling over and over again to his dour and lonely existence. Each edition has its excellent moments and each a weakness. I am partial to A Muppet Christmas Carol with Kermit as Bob Cratchit and Rizzo, the Rat. But it is the oldest version of one man's redemption (1951) with Alastair Sims as Scrooge that always makes me think, and cry, the most. Meanness and crachtityness fit him like a glove so that when the kindly transformation washes over him that is the persona that doesn't seem to align with his true self. We see him as the bitter miser who works hard over the course of the night to change. As his dark hours progress through the Ghostly visitors Sims, as Scrooge, looks just as surprised by the transformation as we are. And at the end when Scrooge speaks about how the events have affected him we know he really has embraced the Christmas spirit \sim "I will honour Christmas in my heart, and try to keep it all the year. I will live in the Past, the Present, and the Future. The Spirits of all Three shall strive within me. I will not shut out the lessons that they teach!"

What is the most wonderful time of the year? Not the perfect moment we have orchestrated with decorations, or perfect food... or perfect gifts, or even perfect people. Instead, the most wonderful time is that moment when we are working at something and feel the contentment inside that no one can describe. A wonderful time occurs in an uncontrollable laugh that comes out of the blue. It is that moment when you look around and realize you are with the people who accept and love you, even though you always cry at movies. Wonderful times are unscripted, uncontrolled, and serendipitous. Scrooge's lost love, Belle, summed up what held him back from enjoying his life ~ "You fear the world too much."

Here's to moving through 2015 without fear, Georgina Gryc Park

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
